Mayor Baraka's Strong, Transparent Run Provides a Stark Contrast

INTRODUCTION

"You can't not raise your own money and then have a \$35 million piggy bank ... "

-- Newark Mayor Ras Baraka challenging Spiller during the 2025 Democratic primary¹

It was actually a \$45 million piggy bank² -- scandalously appropriated by NJEA leadership from New Jersey teachers' highest-in-the-nation dues without their knowledge or consent.³ Mayor Baraka was right to question NJEA President Sean Spiller's ability to rely on a massive, dues-funded piggy bank. Spiller was a failed mayor of Montclair and a long-shot candidate who was unable to raise his own money for his run. He only kept his candidacy alive by using his \$45 million piggy bank to outsource his campaign to Working New Jersey, a dark-money Super PAC overseen by three NJEA insiders.⁴ Working New Jersey then profligately and unaccountably went on a spending spree for Spiller's vanity run.

The Democratic primary election results tell the real story. Despite the \$45 million piggy bank, Spiller's performance was nothing short of disastrous: a fifth-place finish with 89,472 votes, a mere 10.6% of the total, amounting to a jaw-dropping \$502 per vote -- that is, *\$502 of member dues per vote*. Baraka's own run provided a stark contrast: it was supported by \$8.1 million, of which Baraka was responsible for raising \$7.5 million, or 92% of the total. With total expenditures of \$7.9 million, Baraka finished second in the race with 173,951 votes, or 20.7% of the vote, amounting to \$45 spent per vote. Baraka managed to double up Spiller's vote tally while spending less than 1/10th per vote. In other words, Spiller spent over 10x the money per vote for half the results.

\$45 million was the most money ever spent on a gubernatorial primary candidate in New Jersey history -- by far. Yet, in contrast to Baraka's transparency, much of the unprecedented spending behind Spiller was opaque. There remain many serious and unanswered questions about how and why the millions were spent:

- Why was \$6.2 million spent on wave upon wave of redundant mailers?
- Why was \$10.1 million for GOTV sent to an obscure consulting firm with no apparent expertise in GOTV? Who was paid what at AP Consulting?
- What were the three NJEA insiders running Working New Jersey -- Ed Richardson, Steve Wollmer, and Gayl Sheppard -- paid?
- Who made the spending decisions at the NJEA and Working New Jersey and why was the money spent in such a wasteful and questionable way?

So far, there have been no answers, no explanations, and no accountability. Current NJEA leadership is largely the same as leadership during the Spiller debacle, and they have predictably stonewalled any and all calls for accountability.⁵

It's an enormous scandal: NJEA leadership (including the conflicted Spiller) appropriated \$45 million of dues without teachers' knowledge or consent and then profligately wasted it with opaque, questionable spending. Will there ever be any accountability?

I. SPILLER'S DISASTROUS, WASTEFUL RUN FOR GOVERNOR⁶

Dues-funded Super PACS run Spiller's campaign. In 2022, with the [unpopular and controversial](#) -- indeed, failed -- Montclair Mayor Sean Spiller facing dim prospects for re-election, NJEA leadership -- including the conflicted Sean Spiller⁷ -- began covertly sending \$5 million to Protecting Our Democracy,⁸ a dark-money Super PAC that served as a platform for Spiller's gubernatorial ambitions until he officially declared himself a candidate.⁹ Once Spiller announced his candidacy in 2024, NJEA leadership -- including the conflicted Spiller -- sent another \$40 million to a different dark-money Super PAC, Working New Jersey, which was run by former-NJEA officials Ed Richardson, Steve Wollmer, and Gayl Sheppard. As a dark-money Super PAC, Working New Jersey could spend unlimited amounts of money supporting Spiller's run with limited disclosure requirements. It proved to be the ideal piggy bank for Spiller, just as Mayor Baraka noted.

The only way NJEA leadership could spend such a large amount of money on Spiller's piggy bank was by tapping into the NJEA's \$130 million pool of annual dues, which is exactly what they did. As seen in Table 1, Garden State Forward (GSF)¹⁰ covertly spent over \$44.9 million of dues on the two pro-Spiller, dark-money Super PACs. It was the most money ever spent on a gubernatorial primary candidate in New Jersey history.¹¹

Disastrous results for a "vanity" run.¹² Given all the dues money spent, Spiller's election-day results were nothing short of disastrous: a fifth-place finish with 89,472 votes, a mere 10.6% of the total, amounting to a jaw-dropping \$502 per vote -- that is, *\$502 of member dues per vote*. Given his controversial past, Spiller was always a long-shot, who was neither supported by the public nor even by teachers.¹³ Spiller's was truly a "vanity" run.

Working New Jersey was 99% of Spiller's run. Spiller never gained traction with the voting public, raising a mere \$454,512, which allowed for no paid staff and made him the only candidate to fail to qualify for matching funds. With \$40 million of dues available for his primary run from Garden State Forward and unable to raise his own money, Spiller effectively outsourced his election campaign to Working New Jersey.¹⁴ Working New Jersey spent 99% of the money backing Spiller's primary run. Overseen by a trio of former-NJEA execs, run by an outside political pro, and with \$40 million to

burn, Working New Jersey spent lavishly. All told, Working Jersey alone spent an astounding \$446 for each of Spiller's 89,472 votes¹⁵ -- 10x Baraka's \$45 per vote.

Table 2 breaks down Working New Jersey's and the Spiller campaign's expenditures. As can be seen, the Spiller campaign's actual expenditures were de minimis when compared to Working New Jersey.

II. STARK CONTRAST: BARAKA'S STRONG AND COST-EFFECTIVE RUN

The contrast with Baraka's run is striking. While Spiller's results were dismal, Baraka's were surprisingly strong: he finished in second place with 173,951 votes, which was 20.7% of the total. Baraka's was able to raise \$2,764,127 for his campaign, which qualified him for \$4,691,591 in matching funds, bringing his total receipts to \$7,455,718.

Baraka's run was also supported by a Super PAC, One New Jersey United (ONJU), which spent a total of \$656,485. So 92% of the spending behind Baraka came from his own fundraising efforts compared to 1% for Spiller. Table 3 breaks down the expenditures.

Baraka's spending reveals Working New Jersey's profligate waste. Beyond the strikingly different election results, there were several notable disparities between the Spiller and Baraka runs. Table 4 shows that with \$40 million to spend, Working New Jersey alone was able to outspend the combined Baraka effort by almost 4x for Cable TV/Digital Media, and by 22x for Mailers/Flyers/Billboards.

Questionable spending decisions by the NJEA and Working New Jersey. The spending behind Spiller was unprecedented for a New Jersey gubernatorial primary. NJEA leadership should be required to explain why they saw fit to spend such a massive amount of dues money on such a long-shot bid.

Working New Jersey should also be required to explain its spending decisions. In particular, the \$6.2 million spent on mailers alone deserves explanation, given the [reports](#) of inundation by wave upon wave of pro-Spiller mailers. But at least the expenditures in most of these categories were to well-known, national firms. Working New Jersey's main vendor for Cable TV/Digital Media was [Bully Pulpit Interactive](#), which was paid \$19,859,584. Working New Jersey's main mail vendor was [Ourso Beychok](#), which was paid \$6,204,431. But other areas of Working New Jersey's spending are far more opaque and demand both disclosure and explanation.

III. TRANSPARENCY VS. NON-DISCLOSURE: WHO IS AP CONSULTING AND WHY WERE THEY PAID \$10.1 MILLION?

Baraka's GOTV spending was transparent. Baraka's outperformance was largely attributed to his ability to turnout minority voters in New Jersey's urban centers, especially Newark.¹⁶ Unsurprisingly, Baraka spent over \$1 million on his GOTV efforts, mostly to his brother's Newark-based firm, Bottom Up Consulting. There's not much public information available about Bottom Up Consulting, but because of the reporting requirements for campaigns (as opposed to Super PACs), we know exactly where that money went. Appendix B provides an example of the Baraka campaign's disclosure for its June 3, 2025 GOTV expenditures¹⁷: the names, addresses, and amount of payment are provided for each sub-payee, which comprise nine pages of the filing. In total, \$250,000 went to Bottom Up and the listed sub-payees, from 27 different towns in nine counties, in amounts ranging from \$30 to \$8,5000 -- with most in the low-hundreds of dollars (see Appendix B).

Working New Jersey's is not. As shown in Table 5, Working New Jersey spent an astounding \$10.1 million on GOTV for Spiller -- almost 10x what Baraka's vaunted operation spent. But where did that money go?

It took a lot of digging to find out. From Working New Jersey's ELEC filings, we know that \$9,408,567 was sent to AP Consulting Firm for "canvassing" in support of Spiller. We also learned from Garden State Forward's Internal Revenue Service (IRS) filings that an additional \$1 million was sent directly to AP Consulting, bringing the total to \$10,408,567. We then learned from Garden State Forward's Federal Election Commission (FEC) filings that \$267,353 of the \$10.4 million was spent in support of four candidates for federal office (Kamala Harris, Andy Kim, Herb Conaway, and Sue Altman). That makes a total of \$10,141,214 sent to AP Consulting in support of Spiller.

But that's all we know about how that money was spent because Super PACs are not required to disclose their expenditures the way the candidates' campaigns are. We only know that \$10.1million went to AP Consulting.

The mystery of AP Consulting. The little we know about AP Consulting is hardly reassuring. AP Consulting was a mysterious and opaque political operator.

Politico noted at the time that Working New Jersey's multimillion expenditure was “odd-seeming,” given that AP Consulting was “a tiny company run by former Newark Board of Education member Ariagna Perello that specializes in tax prep.” Sunlight found AP Consulting’s [Facebook page](#), which lists accounting services, tax preparation, insurance, translations, airline tickets, divorce, and event promotion. Below is a picture of AP Consulting's office:



As can be seen on the Facebook page and in the picture, nothing related to GOTV or canvassing whatsoever.

According to *Politico*, the canvassing field operations were run by James Souder, who was a major in the National Guard and:

... briefly Newark's director of neighborhood and recreational services but stepped down amid an alleged [nude photo incident](#) and general dissatisfaction with his job performance, and later served as a legislative director for the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans Affairs.

We cannot discern the expertise that would justify \$10.1 million in payments.

An extremely large expenditure for canvassing. As *Politico* also pointed out, \$8.3 million (at the time) was an extremely large amount for canvassing. Working New Jersey “spent as much just on canvassing as his rival candidates’ actual campaigns are allowed to spend, period.” As we know now, the number was actually \$10.1 million, which was more than the \$8.7 million the other candidates could spend *in total*¹⁸ and almost 10x what Baraka spent on his highly effective GOTV operation.

Sunlight did the math: Working New Jersey’s lead political consultant, Craig Varoga, [stated](#) that its canvassing operations knocked on 900,000 doors and had a quarter million conversations with prospective voters, so \$10.1 million means \$11.27 per door knocked, or \$40.56 per conversation. How much is that per hour? It appears James Souder’s canvassers were exceptionally well-paid. Why? And why were they so ineffective compared to Baraka's canvassers?

Will there ever be an accounting of what went on at AP Consulting? Of whom was paid what and why?

IV. NON-DISCLOSURE: WHAT WERE THE FORMER-NJEA EXECS AT WORKING NEW JERSEY PAID?

There's also non-disclosure about what Working New Jersey paid the three former-NJEA executives: Ed Richardson, Steve Wollmer, and Gayle Sheppard (see Appendix A). While we know that political pro Craig Varoga was paid a handsome \$419,177 for 11 months of work (no Baraka consultant was paid anything close to that), there has been zero disclosure about what these NJEA insiders were paid. Did they work for free? If not, we believe teachers would want to know how much of their dues lined the pockets of these well-connected, former-NJEA execs.

CONCLUSION: CURRENT NJEA LEADERSHIP: NO ANSWERS, NO ACCOUNTABILITY

Current NJEA leadership misleads teachers. Despite the questionable spending, poor results, and profligate waste of member dues, current NJEA leadership (mis)characterized the Spiller debacle as a success. A [statement](#) to members on the NJEA website bore the (false) title "Spiller makes strong showing in Dem primary," and (falsely) claimed that "Spiller finished much stronger than expected ..." President Steve Beatty and Vice President Petal Robertson were unrepentant about their own roles in the debacle: "We are incredibly proud of the campaign Sean ran over the last year ..."

That's because the Spiller debacle occurred on their watch. With the exception of the termed-out Spiller -- who has been entirely erased -- the entire senior leadership of the NJEA remains the same as it was during the Spiller debacle.

The same elected officers. Current President Beatty was the NJEA's vice president from 2022 to 2025, which encompasses the entirety of Spiller's run. Current Vice President Robertson was Secretary-Treasurer -- the third-ranking elected officer -- during the same time-period, so two of the three current elected leadership remain in place. Both were active in the campaign and, as the second- and third-highest-ranking elected officers, both were undoubtedly involved in the decision-making that backed Spiller's run.

The same headquarters staff. The senior executive staff at NJEA headquarters in Trenton also remains the same: Executive Director Kevin Kelleher; Deputy Executive Director Denise Policastro; Director of Communications Steve Baker; and Director of Government Relations for Policy and Politics Deborah Cornavaca. In an interview with [The New Jersey Democrat](#), Baker revealed deep knowledge of leadership's internal decision-making process regarding Spiller's run.

So Beatty, Robertson, and the senior executive staff were all involved in the decision-making about Spiller's run and they all remain in current leadership. They all want to mislead NJEA members into believing the Spiller debacle was a success and sweep the entire scandal under the rug. They have provided no answers and no accountability.

New Jersey teachers paid for *all* \$45 million of this with their hard-earned dues. They deserve some answers and accountability.

APPENDIX A

THE NJEA SUPER PACS THAT FUNDED SPILLER'S RUN

Garden State Forward. Founded in 2013, Garden State Forward is the NJEA's Super PAC and has served as the NJEA's main vehicle for political spending. NJEA leadership has used Garden State Forward as a political slush fund, spending \$122 million on its political priorities, including the \$44.9 million to the two pro-Spiller Super PACs listed below. As a Super PAC, Garden State Forward can spend unlimited amounts of money in support of political candidates, but the expenditures must be independent of the candidates and their political parties. Importantly, Garden State Forward is funded by teachers' highest-in-the-nation, annual dues, which are withheld from every teacher's paycheck and flow automatically to the NJEA. NJEA leadership has never directly disclosed the existence of Garden State Forward to the very teachers whose dues fund it.

Working New Jersey. After Spiller officially announced his candidacy in June 2024, the NJEA launched Super PAC Working New Jersey, the NJEA's main vehicle for supporting Spiller. Working New Jersey was entirely funded by \$39.9 million of dues via Garden State Forward. It was headed by former-NJEA officers Ed Richardson, Steve Wollmer, and Gayl Sheppard. Working New Jersey effectively ran Spiller's campaign, as Spiller's campaign had no paid staff and raised a de minimis amount of money. Working New Jersey's day-to-day operations were run by outside political consultant Craig Varoga.

Protecting Our Democracy. Dark-money Super PAC Protecting Our Democracy was launched in October 2022 to raise Spiller's profile and gain him name recognition and was the initial platform for Spiller's gubernatorial run. From 2022 to 2024, it was secretly funded by \$5 million of dues via Garden State Forward.² Spiller was chairman.

APPENDIX B
